#### Summary

On November 9 & 10, 2021 the Northern Ontario Home and Community Care Network hosted their second virtual conference. Due to COVID 19, the in-person event was postponed again, and a virtual conference was held. The theme of the conference was *Recover, Restore, Transform, Compassion, Connection, Caring.* 

The training was intended to build capacity and provide participants with knowledge, understanding and takeaway tools to better meet the Home and Community Care needs in the communities they work in. Another goal was to network and build relationships among HCC workers. This training was open to Home and Community Care Workers in Northern Ontario.

The firm of Kari Chiappetta Consulting was hired to coordinate the 2021 conference.

The firm of Maverick AV provided technology support for the conference.

Ron Kanutski was contracted as the 2021 Master of Ceremonies for the conference. He was full of energy and humour and participants appeared to appreciate what he brought to this year's virtual conference.

Elder Ken Nash opened the conference with a prayer on the first day and Elder Dora Beardy provided opening prayer on the second day.

Opening remarks were offered by Philina Sky from NOHCCN as well as Robin Cano from FNIHCC.

In total, 109 people registered to attend the training, some First Nations and agencies had multiple attendees viewing and participating from one conference link. 33 different First Nation Communities and organizations were represented at the conference.

#### **Full Conference Evaluation**

The conference evaluation was sent out as an electronic link after the conference. Of the 109 people registered for the conference, 23 completed the evaluation for a completion rate of 21%. Unfortunately, 59 people started the survey but did not complete it or submit.

86% of those who attended found the topics covered in this year's conference to be very relevant and 81% felt more knowledgeable about the topics presented at this year's conference.

As recommended in last year's report, a different virtual platform was used for the conference. Zoom was used and Maverick AV provided full technical support over the 2 days. There were very little if any technical difficulties. One participant stated in their evaluation:

#### **Traditional Medicine in Chronic Care**

In all our sacred teachings, Indigenous societies have relied on Creator, Creation and Natural Law to sustain them. The deep respect our people had for all of this carried them throughout their life road. Respect, reciprocity, relationship and responsibility held them together as they appreciated all Creator and Mother Earth provided for them. Our creation stories sustained them. Ceremony, medicine, song, and dance held them together. Wahkohtowin (Kinship) is one of our main laws. All these sacred teachings are still a strong part of many of our communities. A reawakening is happening. This presentation emphasized the importance of these sacred laws in the work that is being done in Chronic Care.

#### Indigenous Discharge Planner/Transition Facilitator- Jill Marcella & Marinna Read

St. Joseph's Care Group Northwest Regional Palliative Care Program and Indigenous Health Services shared information with participants about palliative care and Indigenous Health services. The Northwest RPCP shared information about Indigenous palliative care education initiatives and program supports and resources available to service providers.

Indigenous Health Services provided information on the current health team and services available to clients of St. Joseph's Care Group. We discussed the importance of the current services, including strong community linkages and collaboration that support comprehensive care approaches while respecting and implementing Indigenous traditional methods when planning transitions for patients.

#### **Innovation Approaches in Wound Care-Jeremy Caul**

Session summary - objectives were:

- To discuss access to wound care services in the remote Northwest, highlighting challenges and opportunities providing care in this catchment. What services does PCT have and how are they accessed?
- Leads into introduction of the Regional Central Intake purpose and promise.
- Technology enhancements to improve remote care use of wound tracking software.

#### Virtual Care for Palliative Care-Laura McCormick

In her presentation, Laura provided an introduction to Home and Community Care. She also discussed how to provide Virtual Palliative Care as well as discussed, the Pros and Cons and ways to address the barriers to providing Virtual Palliative Care.
